- After hours: response may be delayed until next day, seabird may need to be secured (see below).

## ANNUAL SEABIRD FALLOUT SEASON **September - December**

- Many juvenile seabirds are learning to fly from the beginning of September through the end of December. Peak fallout season is during November's new moon.
- During this period, young fledglings often get disoriented by urban artificial lights and become exhausted while trying to fly out to sea.
- The birds can fly inland where they collide with power lines, lights, and other man made structures.

## **How and When to Handle Downed Seabirds:**

- If the seabird is in a safe location out of the sun and will be picked up soon, leave it be!
- If the seabird is in harm's way and may become road kill, predated, or impact the mission, and if after hours, the bird should be secured in a box with ventilation.
- When handling (see photo), cusp the bird firmly without squeezing and keep wings close to the body.
- Gloves, eye protection, and a towel or t-shirt can be used to cover the bird prior to handling.
- Keep the box in a cool, quiet, and dark place until picked up. NEVER feed or water the bird! Only one bird per box!

This often results in injury or death to the seabirds!
