

Toxoplasma gondii is a microscopic parasite that causes the disease toxoplasmosis. It only reproduces in the digestive

system of a cat.



By allowing pet cats to roam outdoors, and abandoning unwanted cats Humans contribute to the spread of T. gondii

Millions of eggs can be spread into the environment from one cat's feces. These eggs are the source of T. gondii infection in monk seals. It only takes one egg to cause an infection.



T. gondii eggs contaminate water, and soil along with the plants that grow in it. Humans wildlife and livestock can consume the eggs and become infected by accidentally ingesting cat litter/fecal particles or consuming under-cooked meat or unwashed produce.





When Hawaiian Monk Seals consume contaminated prey or water they become infected with T. gondii. Toxoplasmosis is one of the biggest threats to monk seals - and is almost always lethal.



## RESPONSIBLE CAT OWNERSHIP

MCBHO 5233.2 Pet and Wildlife Regulations

All pets must be microchipped and registered with MCBH Animal Control Officers (bldg3099)

No pet is allowed to roam free. All pets must be kept leashed and under your physical control at all times.

Do not feed any animals on base unless they are your personal, domesticated pet.

On average outdoor cats kill 2 animals per week.

Free roaming cats can transmit fleas, roundworm, hook worm, cat scratch fever, and toxoplasmosis which can cause serious complications for pregnant women and those with weakened immune systems.
